READINGS for Sunday September 6, 2020.

Ezekiel 33:7-11

In his writings, the sixth-century exile Ezekiel both condemns the nations, including his own, and, beginning in chapter 33, promises Israel's coming restoration. Ezekiel's self-identification as a prophet, that is, a mouthpiece for God, is stated in this excerpt: he must speak both God's judgment and God's mercy. Yet God prefers to render mercy.


Romans 13:8-14

Paul's understanding that the end was near undergirds his metaphors describing the Christian life: wake up; it is day; Christ's light is our armor against sin; we wear Jesus Christ. By "flesh" Paul means the body misused by the power of sin, human life turned in upon itself. Paul's Christianization of the commandments as "love" recalls Leviticus 19:18: "you shall love your neighbor as yourself."

Matthew 18:15-20

The fourth discourse in Matthew's gospel is a collection of instructions for Christian assemblies. The NRSV indicates this focus in its translation of the Greek "your brother" as "another member of the church." The ambiguity in the advice about church discipline is evident when we recall that Matthew has referred to Jesus as a friend of tax collectors. Whom the evangelist meant by the "you" in verse 18 is unclear. Verse 20 indicates the church's faith in the resurrection. The passage anticipates the conclusion of Matthew, in 28:18-20.



PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Our Gospel reading comes from Matthew the 18th chapter verses 15 through 20. I'd invite you to take a moment and read that as well as the other lessons that I mentioned in the beginning of this video and I'll continue on with my message.

Our reading from Romans today has a basic truth in it. It's one that is, I think, almost universally known. We are called to love our neighbor as ourselves, and that captures all of the other commandments.

Doesn't it give us such a wonderful footing for us to live our lives?

Of course we can ask ourselves, "Who is our neighbor?" Some of those answers are pretty obvious: those who we share a community with, those who we go to church with, and certainly our families. We don't call them neighbors, of course, but certainly families are people who we want to treat as we want to be treated. When you get right down to it, it's everybody, isn't it? It includes those we know and those we don't know. It includes those who live half a world away, and don't they feel even closer now with the world feeling so much smaller than it did some years ago?

Everyone really is our neighbor.

When we love folks as we love ourselves, good things happen. We know that. We have common ground. We find common ground. We have good discussions. We work together on common goals. We help those who are in need. We look for ways to build up peace, to find peace with one another.

We have a much better chance of enjoying our lives and living the life that God hopes for us to live when we follow that simple summary of the commandments: love our neighbor as ourselves.

Now we, of course, realize that loving our neighbor isn't always going to work out just the way we intended. Sometimes it's our fault. Sometimes it's our neighbor's fault. Sometimes we just don't know exactly whose fault it is, but things just aren't working out. What do we do then? Sometimes it happens when everybody is well intentioned, but there's conflict.

That's where our Gospel comes in for today.

It gives us some really practical guidance on what we should do in those situations. Now there's lots of other things we can do when there's conflict or difficulty or someone has sinned against us. There are lots of alternative options that are quite contrary really to our gospel for today. We can gossip about it. We can tell other people. We can call the person names. There are all kinds of nasty things that happen when people have conflict with one another and when they can't get along or when one has wronged another.

That's what makes our Gospel passage for today so powerful and so meaningful.

It gives us some good guidance as to what we might do when things just aren't quite working out with someone. We are invited, in summary, to have communication with them. What a gift that is when we have the opportunity to visit with someone. We can find common ground, perhaps when it's least expected.

I often like to tell the story and, perhaps you've heard it before, of a time many years ago when I was a very young man and I was spending some time with my mother-in-law. A very hot button social issue came up in our conversation and we took a deep breath knowing that each of us had very different views on that issue. Frankly, we were thinking, probably, that the other one was sinful in in their approach to that very difficult issue. Now the details aren't really that important at this point, who was on which side and why we had our particular opinions. But we had them, and they were strong but we talked and we discussed the issue and we were amazed at what happened. Just the two of us visited with maybe my wife and father-in-law looking on. We were amazed, once we got to talking, just how close we were on that topic. Oh yes, we did have different opinions. We came to, in the end, a different conclusion, but

many of the same faith-based beliefs underpinned both of our opinions. Many of the same ethical considerations strengthened each of our cases. Yes, we did come to different conclusions but we had a very meaningful discussion.

That kind of conversation, I think that's what our Gospel is getting at today. We are invited, when there's a problem, to go and talk to the person, person-to-person, on the same playing field, on the same on a level playing field. A time where we can take turns, share our opinions, share our thoughts, share our reasoning, and listen to the other and have a good and meaningful conversation.

Sometimes those conversations might involve other people and I think that's addressed in our Gospel passage for today as well. Other people can help us to sort things out, maybe even serve as a mediator, helping to clarify what might not be understood one to another.

We give thanks for those special relationships and those people who can help us. Maybe it's a member of our congregation. Maybe it's someone who's a bit more separated from the issue, isn't quite as invested, or has a way of seeing both sides of things.

We give thanks for those kinds of conversations.

We must also remember that our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ is with us wherever two or more are gathered. We trust that Jesus is there with us and what a gift that is.

We give thanks for the opportunity to love our neighbors as ourselves. We also give thanks that our Christian faith through today's Gospel reading and others gives us the tools to live faithfully in this world. It is a place where we know things don't always go smoothly, where people don't always agree, people don't always understand things in exactly the same way. Sometimes those disagreements can be very contentious.

What a gift it is for us to have a process for reconciliation where God is fully involved.

Might we take some time for prayer as we look for ways to get back to loving one another as we ourselves would like to be loved. Amen.

⁷So you, mortal, I have made a sentinel for the house of Israel; whenever you hear a word from my mouth, you shall give them warning from me. ⁸If I say to the wicked, "O wicked ones, you shall surely die," and you do not speak to warn the wicked to turn from their ways, the wicked shall die in their iniquity, but their blood I will require at your hand. ⁹But if you warn the wicked to turn from their ways, and they do not turn from their ways, the wicked shall die in their iniquity, but you will have saved your life.

¹⁰Now you, mortal, say to the house of Israel, Thus you have said: "Our transgressions and our sins weigh upon us, and we waste away because of them; how then can we live?" ¹¹Say to them, As I live, says the Lord God, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but that the wicked turn from their ways and live; turn back, turn back from your evil ways; for why will you die, O house of Israel?

Second Reading: Romans 13:8-14

⁸Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. ⁹The commandments, "You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet"; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, "Love your neighbor as yourself." ¹⁰Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.

¹¹Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; ¹²the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; ¹³let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. ¹⁴Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

GOSPEL: Matthew 18:15-20

[Jesus said to the disciples:] ¹⁵"If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. ¹⁶But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. ¹⁷If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector. ¹⁸Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. ¹⁹Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. ²⁰For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them."

Theological Reflection

Jesus instructs the disciples, "if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector" (Matt. 18:17). At first this sounds like condemnation, but consider the people Jesus welcomes, eats with, and heals. Jesus eats with Zacchaeus the tax collector and even declares, "Today salvation has come to this house, because he too is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost" (Luke 19:9-10). It seems when some are lost and turn away, Jesus is even more deeply invested in their lives.

Theological Reflection

Twice in today's first reading God calls Ezekiel "mortal," as though it is his name. This is a not-so-subtle way of reminding Ezekiel, and us, that he is not God. He bumps up against the limits of being human. Unlike God, sooner or later mortals die. The question of the day seems to center around the sort of life we will live. Is it a living death apart from God, or a full, vibrant life, the life God has intended for creatures and creation?
